



LOVING ONE ANOTHER

We don't just want to be a church where people gather to worship, listen to a sermon and then go home 'til next time. We are trying to create a Jesus-centred community. We long to be a community that feels like family, no matter who you are. 2022 was a year when we intentionally created space for doing 'life together' as a church family.

Sometimes that happened when we gathered around tables or on picnic blankets and shared meals. Often that happened as we opened our homes to one another to extended hospitality. In the summer months we spent many Sunday afternoons enjoying picnics in Victoria Park. The second annual baseball game was another big hit.

Key to our vision of being a Jesus-centred community is Home Church, when we meet in each other's homes to pray together, discuss the Bible, and build relationship. Home Churches exist to create environments where people can make meaningful friendships with a small group of people, encouraging and supporting one another through life's ups and downs, and helping each other grow as disciples of Jesus.

We had a spring and fall semester of Home Churches in 2022. In the spring we spent 6 weeks on "BLESS" - discussing five everyday ways we can practice loving our neighbours, based on the book BLESS by Jon and Dave Ferguson.

The Fall session was seven weeks and included discussion on what the Bible says about life after death and what lies ahead, based on a sermon series Pastor Michael called "Hereafter."

It was great to see Home Churches growing in number and size in 2022, and to hear stories of care and support among group members.

Also encouraging this year was the increase in the number of new Canadians finding a home with us. People from all over the world are joining the Immanuel family and helping our church better reflect the beautiful diversity of the communities in which we live.

HELP MINISTRY

Many people in our neighbourhoods are struggling to get by. Our Help ministry fund is used to help in ways such as: paying power bills, paying rent, providing grocery store vouchers, purchasing home heating oil, and more. Hardworking volunteers take calls and meet with clients weekly to identify needs, and provide holistic support. In the wake of Hurricane Fiona in the fall of 2022, the Help Ministry supported people who were affected in a variety of ways. We were blessed to receive donations from our Baptist brothers and sisters across the CBAC who generously contributed \$7000 to our Fiona relief fund.

We are so thankful for our many volunteers and church folks who know the blessing of giving with a cheerful heart. These 21 families are thankful for your abundant generosity!




















REFUGEE MINISTRY

When the war broke out in Ukraine, a team was quickly formed of people willing to sort out the logistics of inviting a family from Ukraine to relocate to Truro, and live in the church basement (the Youth Lounge, converted to an apartment) while settling into new life in Canada. The team quickly created a lovely and functional living space then met the Sucharevskie family at the airport on June 21st.

The team and other volunteers assisted the family to get settled, fill out government paperwork, secure a job for Maksim, and sign their oldest child up for school. The Sucharevskies became part of our church family and Maks even joined the worship team. The church as a whole has expressed such joy from sharing God's love to this family, in such tangible ways.

"We came to Canada as a family and the church kindly provided us with its premises, where the youth ministry had previously taken place. We are very grateful to Pastor Michael, Pastor Hannah for their comprehensive help and support to our family. We are also grateful to all those people from the church who thought over our life and stay in this place to the smallest detail. We saw with what care and love people made our bedroom, dining room, kitchen and children's corner. There were things that made us feel at home. Family photos, small pillows, warm blankets and homemade blankets. It was amazing and touching! How did people living so far from our country imbued with sympathy, understanding and love for us? We were touched... we were moved to tears! And we were pleasantly surprised to meet so many interesting, kind, sensitive people. Canada is too far from Ukraine, but here we felt at home! It was the love of Christ that knows no bounds. For this love there is no language barrier, state borders, national differences.

This is the all-encompassing love of Christ, and we have seen it here in this church."

PARTNERSHIP

■ CBAC JUSTICE SUMMIT

In November the first CBAC Justice Summit was held, hosted at Immanuel. CBAC churches were encouraged to send delegates to this two-day event, so they could begin discerning where God was calling them to address

injustice in their own community. The event included a keynote speaker, workshops, a panel discussion and more. From delegates, workshop leaders to CBAC staff, the Summit was attended by about 75 people. We sent ten delegates from Immanuel and have already made some progress in using the information from the Summit to plan a way forward, as Christians seeking Biblical justice in our town.

NEXT GENERATIONS MINISTRIES

2022 was a great year of growth among our kids, youth and families who participate and connect with Immanuel, allowing our church and programs to be a place where they can encounter Jesus, and explore what it means to know and follow Him.

WOW NURSERY & PRESCHOOL

World of Wonder is a fun play environment for little ones to go during the church service. In September we were able to open the Preschool room again, allowing for a short video-based lesson and activity for toddlers. We are thankful for our volunteer coordinator and about 10 helpers who help make WOW a safe and happy place for everyone.



DISCOVERY PARK KIDS

We offer a Sunday morning kids program specially designed for elementary aged children to learn about Jesus, the Bible, and what following Jesus could look like in their own lives.

DP Kids is led by the NextGen Pastor, with assistance from seven committed volunteers and other helpers, using a variety of learning styles, including large group lessons and games, small group discussion, and video material.

PARTNERING WITH PARENTS

Parents have more time and influence over their young children than our NextGen Pastor and volunteers, so we equip parents to continue discipleship at home with "Take-Home" packages prepared for families leading up to Easter and Christmas.

We also utilize an "Immanuel | Families" Facebook Group to keep connected and post mid-week "Making it Stick" discussion questions to correspond with certain DP lesson series

YOUTH

Led by the NextGen Pastor, with the help of nine volunteer youth leaders, our weekly Tuesday Night Youth Group was able to run consistently throughout the school year - as an energetic, welcoming and non-judgmental place for teens to learn about Jesus, build friendships and hangout. In September we were able to open up right after school again on Tuesday, as we had before Covid.

We began the year in our Youth Lounge, then from September to December relocated to the main lobby and Worship Centre of the church (to allow our Lounge to become an apartment for a UKR refugee family).

Teens often invite their friends to Youth Group, so we have been seeing new faces almost weekly! We have gotten to know 60 teens over the past year, and maintained ongoing contact with the majority of them.

Two van-loads of teens were able to attend a scaled-back ONE CON in May, at Rock Church, Halifax.













SUMMER

Two summer students were hired to lead special kids and youth events for July and August.

They hosted a week-long basketball day camp, coached by Athletes in Action and held at Truro Elementary School. Immanuel was the site for our 5-day evening kids camp ("Monumental" VBS). Our summer students also planned special events such as cooking lessons, nerf gun fights and a pool party.

YOUTH MISSION TRIP

Throughout the year our mission trip participants have prepared for an upcoming trip to El Salvador (happening March 2023), with spiritual formation and fundraising. We were able to do some team building, preparation, and raise \$23,000. Thank you to everyone who has supported us!

Greetings from Camp Pagweak !!! And a great big thank you on behalf of our campers, our staff and our boards for your continued prayer and financial support. 2022 was another wonderful year at your camp !!!

We were able to host for the first time elementary school groups in June and had 10 different classes from Amherst, Oxford, Springhill and Pugwash come and spend an amazing fun day. Around 200 kids came to Pagweak in June !!!! And a number of them came back for a week in the summer!!

For the first time since 2019 we were able to host our Celebration Sunday, the last weekend in June and we had approximately 75 people of all ages come and join us for the afternoon. Plans are for next year to continue this event but to make it more of a kid friendly day and open it up for families to come and try some of our amazing activities as well as to celebrate the goodness of God together.

Staff this year came together just like it has over the past few years and we had an amazing team who not only loved our campers but truly loved each other no matter what position on staff they had. There were amazing ways that God showed up and provided us with the staff we needed, truly only like He could do. Our lifeguard had a change of heart at the last minute but in the midst of that God had a plan and provided us with an amazing young lady from Woodstock, NB who was in a youth group there led by a former Pagweaker (camper, staff and board member) and her husband and that allowed us to move another Senior Cabin Leader into the Lifeguard role. arrived during our last staff training and fit like a glove. Of note is that of our 12 senior leadership roles at camp, 8 of those have either graduated from Crandall (1), or are in attendance this year at Crandall (6) or Acadia (1). That in itself is amazing and speaks of the commitment to Jesus amongst our staff.

Again, we were blessed with your donations and student grants from both the provincial and federal governments,

Cumberland County, the Canadian Baptist Women, the Atlantic Baptist Foundation and a generous donation from the Wittenburg Baptist Church.

Upgrades to camp this summer included a new sound system to be used inside and outside, a Frisbee golf course (7 holes around the property), new polyethylene picnic tables, an upgrade to our bouldering shelter and a system that allows our campers to choose their activities to participate in each day (more below).

Summer camp was a huge success. We moved to 7 weeks and rented the property out to Deaf Youth Leadership Camp for one week in late July. During those 7 weeks we hosted almost 300 campers. Of those campers 30 of them accepted Jesus as their personal saviour during their time with us. We started a new way of participating in our many activities (crafts, rock wall, biking, archery, kayaking, sports, outdoor cooking, low challenge, etc) and the campers got to choose every day (Mon-Thurs) which 3 activities they would like to do. In the past everyone did all the activities and did them with their cabin. This new way of doing activities each day really increased interest in our activities as they were choosing them and therefore their interest level in each was much higher.

This year we moved to having an online system for registration to do our best to keep up with the technology of our camper families. It was adequate but not really designed for camps and did cause us and sometimes our families some frustration. In 2023 we will be moving to an online system that will be connected to our website that is specifically designed for camps and will be tailored over the next couple of months to our camp even more specifically to reduce or eliminate this frustration, keep up with the world, make it easier for camper families to register and give my staff and myself more efficient and useful information about our campers each week from registration to follow up.

Unfortunately Fiona came and caused some disruption. She brought down numerous trees and wires on the property but other than blowing shingles off 2 cabins and the director's house no buildings were damaged, despite trees lying on roofs or just missing buildings. Fiona did wash away our stairs but God has

provided a solution (as He so often does) for us to replace the loss with retractable stairs at a very affordable price.

The camp with increased revenue from elementary groups, rentals (courtesy of our new dorm rooms in the main building), etc is continuously hopeful to move to a full time year round director in the next couple of years. (I am presently not year round). To continue moving in that direction they have approved a 4 stage plan to upgrade the directors house so that it is ready for a young couple or family in the near future. Stage 1 is to upgrade the kitchen and upper floor (it is very dated) and that should be mostly complete before the snow flies. Stage 2-3 involve the unfinished basement and creating 2 more bedrooms down there, a washroom and a family room. Stage 4 will hopefully involve moving the washer and dryer down there down the road. Stage 1 is estimated at \$6,000 and Stage 2-4 presently at around \$20,000. Moderator's Report

As we rang in the 2022 new year, we approached it with so much optimism and expectations for the end of our COVID era and a return to more in-person social interactions. That optimism was dampened for the first few months as we continued to live under mandated restrictions, Zoom meetings and very limited in-person ministry opportunities. However, as Spring approached with the promise of new beginnings, restrictions were lifted, in-person worship services returned, Youth group meetings resumed, Home Church series took place in May / June as well as October / November and we were even able to adapt our church to house a 5 member Ukrainian refugee family for 8 months. The year was a new beginning in so many ways and IBC was blessed with growth.

COVID combined with natural disasters like Fiona had created many wounds and needs that our IBC ministries continued to meet in any way we could locally in our own community, in our region and even in small ways reaching out into the broader world. God was at work through us and He blessed our efforts with baptisms, new members and new searchers open to hearing His message. It has been a privilege to be part of a committed team of leaders who prayerfully guided us through the many challenges of 2022.

Your Leadership Team met 11 times in 2022 and we also participated in 3 congregational business meetings. With the support of both the Leadership Team and the Deacons, the Vision Team met regularly throughout 2022 developing a new governance structure proposal for IBC which has been shared with the congregation at various stages of development. Change is almost always difficult and getting a governance structure right takes wisdom, time and cooperation. The Vision Team, Leadership Team and Deacons all want to get it right and have benefitted from the congregational feedback that has been received. I look forward to seeing the new structure presented to the full congregation for approval and when approved, implementation early in 2023.

Throughout all of the increased ministry activities, policy analysis and collective worship times we've also maintained our focus on transparency so that everyone in our IBC family is aware of and part of the ministry and mission. With the weekly emails from Pastor Michael supported by the monthly Moderator email updates, communications from the pulpit and informal communications from all members of the Leadership Team, it is our prayer that we will continue to move forward and thrive as a congregation together. There are so many scriptures that tell us of the value of wisdom, discretion, and unity but one of my favorites is Proverbs 2: 2-11.
